



1. RESTORATION SUMMARY

June - December 2014

During this period the Restoration team worked with 376 volunteers on the island of Kaho'olawe. The following groups had the opportunity to experience Kaho'olawe: Hawaii Youth Conservation Corps, Oahu Schools Student Focus Group, Hawaii Nature Center (Oahu), Queen Lili'uokalani (Maui And Oahu Branches), Four Seasons Resort Maui at Wailea, Laupāhoehoe Public Charter School, Halau Makani O Maunaloa, Maui Invasive Species Committee, Leeward Watershed Partnership, and Hawaii Islands Restoration.

The groups were primarily focused on the Department of Health (DOH 3) and Hawaii Community Foundation/National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (HCF/NOAA) work areas. Work in the DOH 3 project area consisted of establishing native plants on the hard pan, installing check dams ditches as well as placing barriers to catch wind blown soil and to reduce water velocity over the barren hard pan. The plant survivability and success in the area has been astounding. The plants are well established and seem to need very little irrigation. The HCF/NOAA, Honokanai'a coastal restoration consisted of planting 'aki'aki and control of alien plants.

Plants for both of these projects were donated by The Four Seasons Resort Maui at Wailea and by The Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center (Maui Branch).

Lyman and Jamie presented a poster at the Hawaii Conservation Alliance Conference on O'ahu (July 15-17, 2014). The Poster focused on restoration work in the DOH 3 project area.

The KIRC has a contract with Keala Pono Archeological Consulting to monitor restoration work in and around the archeological sites in the DOH 3 project area.
